EXPLORING GALWAY CITY

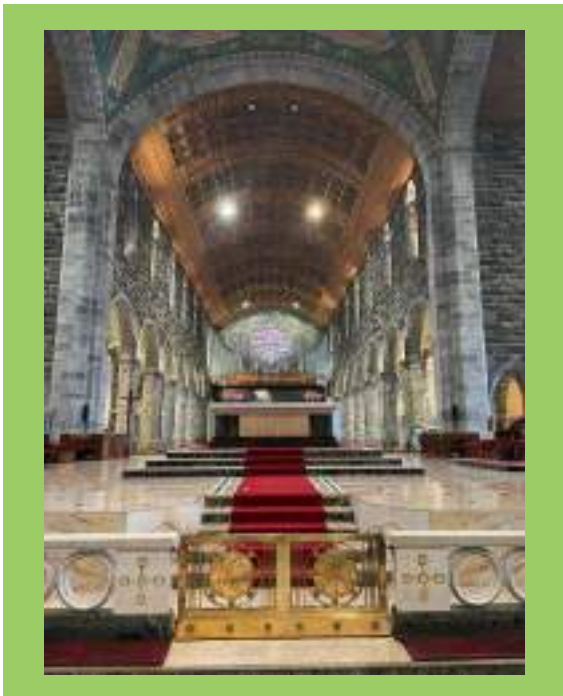
When first arriving in a new place, it's important to learn your way around. And what better way than with a medieval walking tour with local historian Tony O' Leary!

IRISH CULTURE AND LANGUAGE

A quick lesson in the Irish language on the bus prepared the students for a visit to Leitir Mór, the 'Gaeltacht' or predominately Irish speaking part of Galway.

Here, we paid a visit to Muintearas, a community education and training organisation. Students attended an Irish language and culture seminar where we learned about initiatives being undertaken to support the local community such as daycare and after-school services, and a wind turbine which powers parts of the facility. We were also treated to a beautiful song, as Gaeilge, by our host Seán Ó Costella.

Classes in St. Enda's College included Irish history classes on the Great Famine and the Irish Resilience. We were extremely lucky to have a presentation by one of our Colorado students on her hometown of Leadville, the highest city in North America in the Rockies, famous for its mining. Leadville saw thousands of Irish men live and die here in poor conditions in the late 1800s/early 1900s.



ART, MUSIC AND DANCE



Students received an Irish music history lesson and private concert from Irish harpist, Ann Fitzpatrick, and Brian's wife Deirdre.

The Galway International Arts Festival, a two-week long wondrous display of Irish and International art, theatre and music, luckily coincided with the students' visit. Students visited an exhibition called "The Entanglement" addressing the environmental, cultural and human aspects of data.

The Mayor was also keen to know about the students' experience in Galway and if they had any suggestions on how to improve the city, to which they answered that we have a bit of a seagull problem!



A morning was spent with Dr. Jo Fahy in St. Enda's College discussing Global Awareness and Respect.

This included a discussion on the United Nations 17 Sustainable Development Goals and developing solutions to some of the world's greatest challenges in society and the environment.

We were lucky to have a students who heads her New Jersey school's Global Awareness Club to offer some insights and ideas.



CONTRIBUTING TO THE LOCAL COMMUNITY



On their visit to Ireland, students committed to raising funds for charity. The charity chosen was the Galway Simon Community. The Galway Simon Community is a charitable organisation which provides support and accommodation services to people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness in the West of Ireland.

The first challenge was climbing Diamond Hill, a 7.6 km loop trail in the Connemara National Park.

IRISH SPORT

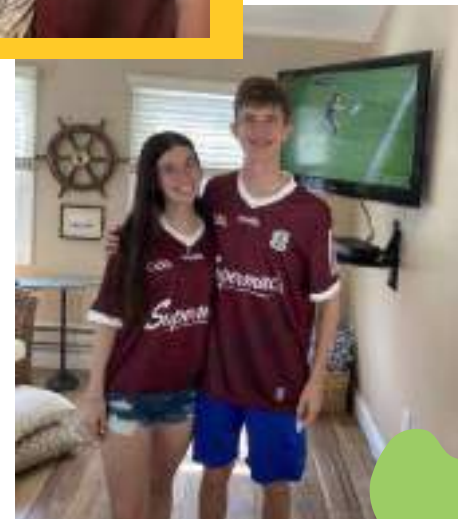
Known as the fastest field sport in the world, students tested out their skills at hurling with a local hurling legend Tom Fox.

Tunes in the Church

The Ynysio the Church concert series returns to Galway after a two-year break. The award-winning series held in St Nicholas' Collegiate Church, will run for three weeks in August, starting next Thursday, August 2.

Quizzes will run twice a week through Friday and will feature some of Galway's finest musicians, singers and dancers, included as part of each event is a historical tour of St Nicholas' Church.

Tunes in the Church began in 2000, set up by Terry Macneil and Galway resident Cormac Hegley, who wanted a way of promoting traditional music that was family-friendly and respected the tradition. It is an acoustic, authentic, personal and interactive representation of Irish music, song and dance.

Interaction between the audience and performers is central to the experience, with relaxed, natural conversation being a feature of all concerts.

The series provides a respectful but fun and friendly setting for the listener and creates a platform where leading exponents of traditional music can showcase their talents.

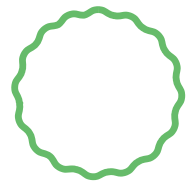
