Our mission is to provide you with an adventurous, fun and unique insight to your Irish heritage.


This booklet tracks the adventures of the class of 2022 giving you a glimpse into what you could experience on this programme.

This exceptional school overlooking Galway Bay, first opened in 1928, is where students would complete their classes.

An orientation session introduced the students to each other and the organisers who would be running the activities.

When first arriving in a new place, it's important to learn your way around. And what better way than with a medieval walking tour with local historian Tony O' Leary!


EXPLORING GALWAY CITY

IRISH CULTURE AND LANGUAGE

A quick lesson in the Irish language on the bus prepared the students for a visit to Leitir Mór, the 'Gaeltacht' or predominately Irish speaking part of Galway. Here, we paid a visit to Muintearas, a community education and training organisation. Students attended an Irish language and culture seminar where we learned about initiatives being undertaken to support the local community such as daycare and after-school services, and a wind turbine which powers parts of the facility. We were also treated to a beautiful song, as Gaeilge, by our host Seán Ó Costella.



Visit to the Kylemore Abbey and Gardens - one of the most visited attractions in Ireland and Europe!

Classes in St. Enda's College included Irish history classes on the Great Famine and the Irish Resilience. We were extremely lucky to have a presentation by one of our Colorado students on her hometown of Leadville, the highest city in North America in the Rockies, famous for its mining. Leadville saw thousands of Irish men live and die here in poor conditions in the late 1800s/early 1900s.



ART, MUSIC AND DANCE



Students received an Irish music history lesson and private concert from Irish harpist, Ann Fitzpatrick, and Brian's wife Deirdre.


World Irish Dancing champions and coaches led our students in a Céilí (Irish music and dance). You can find a video here!

The Mayor was extremely generous with her time, asking individual students about their interests in politics and encouraging the students to ask questions. The Mayor was also keen to know about the students' experience in Galway and if they had any suggestions on how to improve the city, to which they answered that we have a bit of a seagull problem!



A morning was spent with Dr. Jo Fahy in St. Enda's College discussing Global Awareness and Respect. This included a discussion on the United Nations 17 Sustainable Development Goals and developing solutions to some of the world's greatest challenges in society and the environment. We were lucky to have a students who heads her New Jersey school's Global Awareness Club to offer some insights and

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CONTRIBUTING TO THE LOCAL COMMUNITY



On their visit to Ireland, students committed to raising funds for charity. The charity chosen was the Galway Simon Community. The Galway Simon Community is a charitable organisation which provides support and accommodation services to people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness in the West of Ireland.

Students and their families not only donated money but also completed challenges in order to support the charity.

The first challenge was climbing Diamond Hill, a 7.6 km loop trail in the Connemara National Park.

A challenging trek with beautiful mountain and coastal views was completed with several stops for photo shoots, a new friend and a seesaw finale!





This was one of the hottest days of the summer so far which made for even more spectacular views!!


TREASURE HUNT



Their futures are bright and we are excited to see what they grow to achieve!


